8.1 Debate on the following 1st MK Party Motion:

On Thursday, 24 October 2024, hon IH Manchero-Barciela of the MKP moved as follows:

This House notes:

That 100 days after the creation of the Government of Provincial Unity (GPU), there is a need to evaluate its performance and effectiveness in addressing the pressing issues faced by the Province of KwaZulu-Natal.

This House therefore resolves:

To examine the GPU's shortcomings and identify areas for urgent improvement, thereby ensuring accountability and the realignment of priorities for the benefit of all South Africans.

8.2 Debate on the following 1st ANC Party Motion:

On Thursday, 24 October 2024, hon BN Sithole-Moloi of the ANC moved as follows:

This House notes:

Several major infrastructure development projects across the Province of KwaZulu-Natal, having heeded the call made by President Ramaphosa during his first speech in Parliament after the 2024 general elections, when he said, "[...] we have a clear intention to turn our country into a

construction site, as bridges, houses, schools, hospitals and clinics are built [...]”.

This House therefore resolves:

To call for a debate on the economic development stimulated through these major infrastructure development projects that can be seen throughout the Province of KwaZulu-Natal, and especially in rural areas.

8.3 Debate on the following 2nd MK Party Motion:

On Thursday, 24 October 2024, hon JPN Gasa of the MKP moved as follows:

This House notes:

That tuckshops should be regulated by legislation as a matter of provincial priority because we have buried children in Ladysmith because of food poisoning, while children from uMlazi and Lindelani have had to be hospitalised for the same reason; and

Our local economy has been taken over by illegal foreigners while ordinary South Africans continue to miss out on small business opportunities, from salons to retail, barbershops, tuckshops and many more.

This House therefore resolves:

To call for the food industry (manufacturing, processing, etc.) to be regulated to be solely in the hands of those feed the nation – and that is us.

8.4 Debate on the following 1st DA Party Motion:

On Thursday, 24 October 2024, hon M Nair of the DA moved as follows:

This House notes:

That the water supply crisis in KwaZulu-Natal is worsening, with no effective, sustainable solution on the horizon;

That this man-made crisis, which is robbing residents of their most basic human right, is crippling our economy; and

That municipalities are failing to resolve this problem by themselves.

This House therefore resolves:

To remind municipalities that KwaZulu-Natal's success is dependent on whether government can get a consistent and an affordable water supply to residents and businesses – now, not in the future.

8.5 Debate on the following 3rd MK Party Motion:

On Thursday, 24 October 2024, hon Dr MS Mthethwa of the MKP moved as follows:

This House notes:

The challenges faced by Emergency Medical Response Services (EMRS) in KwaZulu-Natal;

EMRS plays a critical role in saving people's lives in a province that is plagued by social ills and high levels of

*violent crime, coupled with poor roads and infrastructure;
and*

While attempts by SAPS to curb crime are ongoing, EMRS probably remains one of the best tools the department can use to reduce deaths associated with crime and accidents.

This House therefore resolves:

To commend EMRS for continuing to play a significant role despite the fact that the department is struggling with budgetary constraints and a high number of medico-legal claims.

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
